KUMASHIRO BLANKS RIVERSIDE ON TWO HITS

Heoji Kumeshiro's two-hit pitching gem enabled McInerny Monarchs to gain a brilliant 8-0 victory over Riverside A. C. in the titular playoff of Palama Settlement's community softball league Sunday morning, June 26th, at Castle field, Palama.

McInerny will meet Harry Char's defend ing-champion Chinese Amateurs in the championship game this Sunday, July 3rd, at 10:00 a.m.

Riverside earned the right to meet McInerny by winning the "C" Section crown. The Monarchs are "A" division champions, while the Chinese Amateurs are "B" winners.

Kumashiro was in brilliant form, tossing hitless ball until the seventh inning when Riverside touched him for a single. He was accorded perfect support by his team-mates, only four Riverside batsmen reaching first, two by passes and the other two through hits.

The Monarchs scored four runs in the first inning, two in the sixth, and two more in the eighth for an easy victory. This Sunday will mark McInerny's second attempt in successive years to wrest the championship from the Amateurs. In the 1937 finals, the Chinese club overcame a big 8-1 lead to annex the title.

PAL CAGERS TO SPONSOR DANCE JULY 4

Palama Settlement's Junior ASUH and Territorial Jr. AAU basketball champions will sponsor a Winged "P" dance on Independence Day, July 4th, in the Palama gym. Music for the affair will be furnished by the popular Blue Harmony band. Dancing will begin at 8:00 and continue until midnight. Admission will be 35¢.

Beckers of the Winged "P" squad and followers of the great indoor game who have watched the fighting Pals smash all Junior opposition throughout the season in spectacular fashion are expected to attend the frolic in large numbers. Proceeds will be used for team awards.

PAL MARATHON SWIM DERBY TO START IN JULY

Palama Settlement will sponsor a marathon swim derby for its members starting July 1st and ending August 1st in the Palama tank. The event is a revival of the all-summer marathon swims that made such big hits with the Pals several years ago. Entries will close Thursday, June 30th, at 4:00 p.m. with Fil Marvin.

Competitors will be divided into three groups, Class "A" for boys over 15 years of age, Class "B" for boys 15 years and under, and Class "C" for boys 12 years and under. Suitable medals will be presented to the winners of each division. Rules for the swim marathon are listed below:

- 1. Each contestant may swim only ONE hour each day and is allowed to swim only 20 hours in all.
- 2. He may swim any number of laps he chooses in the hour. He need not swim every day but is required to complete his 20 hours by 4:00 p.m. August 1st.
- 3. Any stroke may be used and changed while swimming as long as the swimmer touches the end wall on the turns.
- 4. All laps must be counted and recorded by a Palama staff member or any member appointed by a staff worker.

PALAMA TO STAGE TWENTY SIX MILE MARATHON

The Palama Recreation Department will sponsor its third big event of the year, a 26-mile merethon, Labor Day, September 5th, it has been announced by Fil Marvin, Settlement physical director. The Around-Marathon Relay and the Invitational Swim meets complete the headliners on the Pal sport calendar.

Tentatively slated to start at Wright Gate, Schofield Barracks, and finish at the Settlement, the race will be over a tougher course than the Olympic distance. All runners interested in the novel event are requested to begin immediate training.

Sufficient and suitable awards will be presented to all winners. The run will demand more from local maratheners in the way of stamina and condition than any race they have ever been subjected to, and will accord all finishers opportunity to compare their times with Olympic champions.
