Palama Settlement's 1937 edition of her great marathon teams of yore held its initial workout over the Diamond Head five-mile course last Sunday morning, October 24th, under the watchful eye of Coach Louis Mendonca. The Westside harriers traveled the lay-out in commendable time, to serve notice to other clubs that the Winged P road aces are more than ready to defend their championship on January 1, 1938.

The Pals scored a sweeping victory in the last New Year's Day run, registering a first, second, fifth, seventh, and ninth, in winning the team championship. Norman Tamanaha, pint-size Palama ace, William Phillips, Albert Chun, Manuel Perry, and Alfred "Chesty" DeLuize carried the Maroon colors to the top spot ahead of a great Waipahu stable led by Welter Gouveia.

The Waipshu team is favored in many quarters to jog off with the 1938 trophy with a star-studded line-up in harness. However, the Palama squad may smear the dope sheet on the strength of new and promising recruits who are bolstering the Settlement forces.
