Shimamura crowned himself national winner in the 12-13 year class in 1932, and repeated as a 14-15 year old in 1933, while Kudo splashed his way into the 16-17 honor bracket in 1933.

St. Anthony CYO assumed undisputed leadership of Palama Settlement's base-ball loop Sunday, March 10, by virtue of a brilliant 7-6 victory over hengo Kai in the feature game of a triple-bill at the Castle field diamond. The Catholic Youth Organization gained a full game on the idle Young Amateurs although both outfits have yet to be beaten.

St. Anthony can thank pitcher Hazelden for its sixth straight victory. With two hands down, a runner perched on third, and the count knotted at 6-6 in the last inning, Hazelden pulled a Frank Merriwell stunt by walloping one of Tanabe's shoots over the right-field fence to broke up the ball game. Besides his "money" bingle, Hazelden hurled scintillating ball to limit Rengo Kai to six hits. He was accorded brilliant support by his team-mates especially left-fielder Vause. CYO's Coelho was the best sticker of the game with four hits in five attempts. Custino drove in three runs for St. Anthony by homering in the second inning with two on base. Hazelden whiffed six and walked three, while Tanabe allowed nine hits, fanned seven and issued one free pass.
