PAL JUNIORS BOW TO HAIKU IN BITTER GAME

Coach Peter St. Sure's Haiku Red
Reiders, 140 # barefoot football champions
of Maui, added the territorial title to
their list of achievements Sunday afternoon at the Honolulu Stadium, by upsetting the Oahu-champion Pal Juniors 6-0
in a bitterly fought game.

Harry Murakami's Moililis exceeded the fondest hopes of their backers by scoring a brilliant 14-0 victory over Pioneer Mill. This game preceded the Heiku-Palama tussle and carried with it the territorial 125# championship.

Haiku sewed up the ball game early in the fourth quarter on a 15 yard pass into the goal zone. Both teams had battled each other to a standstill prior to the touchdown. Palama lost golden opportunities to strike "pay-dirt" in the second period when the hard-charging Maui forwards stopped them on three occasions within the shadow of the goal-posts.

A big feature of the game was the spectacular punting of "Mongoose" Leandro, Palama booter. Time and again, the elongated Maroon back kicked his team out of danger and backed the opposition into holes.

The 125# bettle was marked by the air-tight defenses of both Moiliili and Pioneer Mill. Murakemi's charges connected twice via the aerial route to gain the margin of victory.
