NELS KAWAKAMI WINS STAFF GOLF TOURNAMENT

Nelson Kawakami, hustling locker-room custodian, won the second annual Palama Settlement Golf Tournament last Thursday afternoon, April 25, at the Moanalua Golf Links by touring the course in 105 strokes minus a 35 handicap, which gave him a net score of 70. Kawakami defeated a dauntless field of 24 shot-makers, including three women, who braved a mild gale and threatening weather to make this year's tournament a bigger and better competition than the 1939 tourney.

Dr. Tenn of the Dental Department finished in second place with a 114-40-74 card, followed by Dr. Lam, Medical Department head, with 95-20-75, and Dr. Conner, Dental chief, with 118-40-78.

For winning the championship, Kawakami was awarded a beautiful golf statuette symbolic of the achievement, while Dr. Lam was presented with three balls for chalking up low-gross score. The special "blind bogey" camera prize was hooked by Miss Larsen.

Kawakami succeeds John Ahn as king of Settlement staff golfers. Ahn, no longer a Palama employee, finished in a tie with Dr. Kuwata, also a former Settlement worker. Scores of all finishers are listed below:
