He was Leonard "Stub" Allison, then recently appointed headman of the California Golden Bears after Navy Bill Ingram's sudden resignation in the middle of the season. It will also be recalled that California suffered two consecutive setbacks at the hands of the Town Team and Rainbow squad / during their sojourn in Hawaii.

Well aware that California Alumni and bleacher-coaches on the Mainland were clamoring for his scalp, "Stub" Allison reminded the Pals to always play every game in life straight, regardless of the circumstances. He hinted that players were being "bought" everywhere, but stated emphatically that his teams will never be so tainted. Palama members who had the good fortune to hear Allison will not soon forget his closing words, "and my flag shall continue to fly high, though wolves are waiting to tear it down."

Sport writers today are labeling Allison's 1937 Golden Bears a wonder team. California is being touted as a cinch for Rose Bowl recognition on the strength of its smashing victories over top-notch Pacific Coast teams. Stub Allison stuck to his guns and made good in a big way. May his flag continue to wave strongly in the breeze.
