

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PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

The Board of Trustees held ten regular monthly meetings during 1961. Attendance averaged twelve members per meeting. Many committee meetings and conferences were held also.

Unfortunately, Mr. Hipa's sudden death on October 17, 1961, brought to an untimely end his long and faithful participation in Palama affairs which we trued to recognize by asking him to serve as a Trustee earlier during the year.

The other new Trustees, along with the older members of the Board, contributed their time unselfishly toward the betterment of Palama. Our Trustee committees were very active. Outstanding service was rendered by the Program Committee headed by our old-reliable Mr. Robert Rath, and the Buildings and Grounds Committee under the chairmanship of Mr. Kenneth Young, which work will result in determining curricular revisions to better the scope of activities at Palama within the limits of its budget, plant, and personnel.

Early in 1961, Mr. Arne Larson was reappointed Executive Director on a continuing contract. His subsequent and somewhat prolonged vacation left the Settlement without full leadership, with the burden thrown upon the staff and a few Trustees during a period when Palama was under financial stress. Mr. Larson's return, together with the appointment of Mr. A. L. Y. Ward as Trustee-treasurer, the Finance Committee headed by Charles Spalding, and the continuation of fund raising activities with all Palama people participating wholeheartedly, should soon bring our financial statement back into "black".

President's Annual Report cont'd:

After some confusion in income and expense allocations among various accounts, we understand that the deficit of \$10,389.94 as of December 31, 1960, was reduced to \$7,108.02 as of December 31, 1961. This is subject to audit. Better weather at carnival time, a bang-up sustaining membership drive, together with a carefully controlled budget should overcome the remaining deficit by the end of 1962.

To our dedicated staff at Palama and to the Trustees, I take this means to express my sincere appreciation of the fine work done during 1961. The new Gymnasium, so ably designed by Trustee Vladimir Ossipoff, is a very significant step ahead in the direction of a greater campus for the work of Palama. We should all continue to strive toward this end, no matter what intermediate hurdles stand in the way in the meantime.


