Three sizzling games and one walk-away were played Sunday, February 4, at Castle field as Palama Settlement's community baseball league offered its second quadruple-bill of the season.

A brilliant last inning rally which netted three runs on three hits enabled Paloma Juniors to nip Rengo Kai 8-7 in the first game of the day. Trailing 5-7, Paloma scored three runs on hits/Hesia, C. Lopez, and Grace, to gain the victory. Jesus and F. Lopez, handled the pitching assignment for Paloma, and limited the hard-hitting Rengo Kais to four bingles while their team-mates pounded Sumida for nine. C. Lopez and H. Lopez, first-sacker and second baseman respectively of the Palomas, paced the victory by/smashing out two hits in three attempts. Back-stopper Taniyama of Rengo Kai also hit twice in three treks to the pan.

Toledo's single in the last inning to score Villa gave Billy's Barber Shop a sterling 5-4 win over the Crusaders in the second tilt. Poliano toiled on the mound for Billy's Barbers, allowing nine hits while fanning 10 and walking one. S. Yano of the Crusaders dished out nine hits, but issued four passes. Hitting stars of the game were Hiroshige, Crusader keystone guardian, with three safeties in as many attempts, and Lee, Crusader shortstop, with three hits in four times up. 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ANNUAL B.C.A. COMPETITIONS SLATED SOON

The annual Boys' Clubs of America Indoor Athletic and Swimming competitions are slated for the month of March, with deadline for postal returns of results to B.C.A. headquarters in New York set at April 15.

Palama has made wonderful showings in both competitions in past years as a Class A organization (Clubs with over 1,000 members). Its individual champions have gained national honors both in indoor track and swimming consistently, helping to spread Hawaii's fame the length and breadth of the land.

Events listed under the Indoor Track Pentathlon are the Standing Broad Jump, Standing Hop, Step & Jump, Running High Jump, Pull-ups, and a one-minute Basket-ball Shoot outside an eight-foot semi-circle. Participation is limited to boys under 18 years of age, with five weight classifications, 80, 95, 110, 125, and Unlimited.

The Swimming competition is divided into four age groups, 12-13, 14-15, 16-17, and 18-20 years, with contests in a 20-yard backstroke, 20-yard breatstroke, 20-yard obstacle, 40-yard freestyle, and a 60-yard freestyle race.

All eligible Palama boys are urged to begin training immediately for the big track and swimming competitions.
