## SENIOR CHRISTMAS PARTY SLATED MONDAY

Palama Settlement's annual Christmas parties for its boy and girl members will be held during the week of December 20th. The first of these will be staged Monday evening, December 20th, by the Maverick Club, Senior Girls' Club, and the Junior Trailers, at 7:30 p.m. in the Girls' Club-rooms. ## PALAMA BOWS TO APOLLOS IN CAGE THRILLER

The Winged P Junior basketball team were handed the short end of a 30-28 score for its first defeat in three games by Sam Apoliana's surprisingly tough Apollos, last Thursday evening, December 9th, at the University of Hawaii gym, in a thrilling battle.

Failure to hit the basket consistently proved the downfall of the Pals, Francis Sing being the sole Maroon cager able to score. Chung, Koo, Abili, Wong, Smith, and Tomita, were way off form.

Trailing 20-11 at halftime, Palama greeted the next period with a brilliant rally to forge ahead 24-22 with less than ten minutes to play. However, the Apollo forwards clicked again with their spectacular long-range firing to insure them the victory. Free throws played a major part in the Pals' upset, giving the opposition 7 points on 11 fouls, while registering only 1 out of 3.

Francis Sing was the whole offensive show for Palama, ringing the bell for 10 points, while Akamine and Gega played their hearts out at guard.

Palama Settlement will meet Citywide A.A. tomorrow at 8:00 p.m. in a crucial game, and the University of Hawaii "C" squad Friday, December 17th, at 9:00 p.m. A loss will throw the Pals out of the championship running. Aiea and Tam's Meluhians, two of the strongest teams in the ASUH loop, must be defeated before Palama can gain the titular play-offs.

## ELDERS' CLUB ORGANIZED AT PALAMA

The Elders' Club for Pal Senior members was organized last week after a stormy session with Settlement officials which cleared up all preplexing problems on the senior athletic front, and which ended with a perfect understanding of the real recreational situation on the part of everyone concerned.
