

MR. NOLLE SMITH TALKS TO PAL CLUB

Mr. Nolle R. Smith of the Hawaii
Bureau of Governmental Research, member
of the Settlement Recreation Committee,
and founder of the Pal Club, returned to
the scene of his old love and spoke to a
representative gathering of Palama youth
on the tremendous progress of Sociology
during the past decade, last Sunday morning, March 21st, at 9:00 a.m. in the
Palama auditorium.

Portraying in vivid word-pictures, the impressions and reactions gained in his recent research tour of the Mainland, Mr. Smith gave eloquent praise to the present administration in Washington in its attempt to promote the welfare of the nation's youth. He also emphazied the fact that living conditions in Hawaii cannot be compared with the miserable existence of people in the tenement districts of principal Mainland cities, especially in Chicago. Mr. Smith stressed the need of local-born men on the plantations, citing the fine pioneer work that is being done by Oahu sugar companies.

In closing, Mr. Smith described the novel facilities of Washington D.C., the nature of its individual functions, and the intricate set-up of its administration. Summarizing the data gained thru his intensive studies, Mr. Smith left with his audience, the conviction that Hawaii is indeed a "paradise" in the Pacific.

100 ATTEND 5th WOMENS PLAY DAY

Over one hundred women have registered for the Fifth Inter-Island Play Day sponsored by the Molokai Community Center at Kaunakakai this year. The Inter-Island Play Day started by the Alexander House Settlement five years ago, has been held on three of the Islands to date. This year will be the first time for Molokai and the first time that all of the Islands will re represented. The Play Day has for its immediate objective the fostering of the "Play for Play Sake" spirit and for its more subtle objectives the broadening of horizons and affording of an experience which otherwise would be denied many of the Island girls and women.

The "Hostess Island" which this year is Molokai is responsible for the housing, feeding, and entertainment for the entire group. A registration fee of \$4.00 per individual is charged to help defray Play Day expenses.

Thirty Honolulu girls and women from the Citywide Association and Palama Settlement are representing Oahu. Miss E. W. Zulawinski, the Girls' and Women's Activity Director and Mrs. Ethel Kukea, the Physical Ed Teacher, are accompanying the Settlement group as advisors and will also assist with the officiating at the Play Day. Miss Belle Kellogg, the Women's Recreation Director in charge of the Citywide group arrangements, will not be able to attned. Her place will be filled by Margaret De Corte and Alice Kalahut of the Playground Director's Associa# tion, who will share the responsibilities.

The Hilo and Maui Play Day delegates numbering 48 will arrive in Honolulu Monday morning at 6:30 and will have a day in Honolulu. The local organizations are planning sifhtseeing trips and offering transportation as a courtesy to the group. The ertire group will sail at 5:00 p.m. for Molokai where the following program is planned to take place;
