Tommy Wong's Pirates won the championship by outclassing the field and placed three of their stars on the mythical first string. McInerny Monarchs, last year's titlists, Moli Cafe, and Castle A.C. were given one berth apiece.

Towering above the forwards were RICHARD LOUI of the Pirates, and HENRY SILVA, McInerny ace. Both men were spearheads of their team's attacks, and were with out a doubt, the finest shooters in the league. UNO of McCully and SHINTO of Riverside were also brilliant shots. WONG and AYAU of the Pirates were right up with the leaders in all departments of play.

Moli Cafe's sensational center, W. OLSEN, was awarded the pivot position by virtue of his sparkling play in every game. He was the whole show for Moli, scoring practically all of their points. KAM of the Mavericks, and Castle's MEHEULA were other fine centers. Meheula finished the season with a rush but Kam was more consistent.

RAYMOND CHUN and LAWRENCE CHUN of the champion Pirates formed the greatest defense combination witnessed in community cage history. They proved answers to a coach's prayers in fulfilling their guard assignments in big league style. Both were also dazzling ball-handlers and deadly shooters, and played a big part in the Pirate victories. ABILI of Castle, and YAMAMOTO of McInerny were other standout guards.

The utility berth was awarded HERB SCHARSCH of Castle A.C. on the strength of his fine all-round play throughout the season. Scharsch was equally proficient in offense and defense, and was an inspiring and heady performer. STAN LEE of the Pirates was also a versatile player, but his tendency to press in the close games cost him the nod. Lee's attitude toward the game was probably the finest in the league - he tried all the time!

6TH AROUND-OAHU MARATHON RELAY SLATED SUN.

Palama Settlement will stage its 6th annual Around-Oahu Marathon Relay this Sunday morning, January 15, with the starting gun scheduled to send lead-off men of five twenty-man squads on the first leg of the 83-mile grind at 8:00 o'clock in front of the Palama administration building on Vineyard street.

Evenly-matched teams representing Waipahu plantation, the defending champion, Citywide A.C., Palama Settlement, Kalihi Valley CYO, and Windward Oahu have been training for the classic since October and are primed to make serious bids for team and individual honors.

Waipahu, led by the peerless Walter Gouveia, won the event in 1937 and '38 and is favored by many to make it three straight this year. However, all organizations entered boast of well-balanced rosters, which should make the 1939 race the greatest yet held. Citywide pressed the rural champions to the finish line last year, and are again a dangerous contender, judging by its brilliant teamvictory in the Diamond Head five-mile run held January 2nd.

The relay record of 8.34:09 was established in 1937 by a great Waipahu team which circled the island faster than it had ever been negotiated on foot before.

Trophies will be presented all organizations starting and finishing the race.

An important meeting of representatives of the five clubs entered in the relay will be held this Wednesday, January 11, at 7:00 p.m. in the Palama recreation office. Final plans and details will be discussed. Team representatives are requested to come prepared with entry fees, rosters, and problems in connection with the race.
