# TWO TEAMS UNBEATEN IN PAL BASEBALL LEAGUE

St. Anthony CYO 4; Billy's Barbers 2
Tony Gora 16; Paloma Juniors 4

The defending-champion St. Anthony CYO and Young Amateurs outfits remained the only unbeaten teams in Palama Settlement's baseball league following completion of the third round of play Sunday, February 11, at Castle field. Two hardfought tussles and a brace of run-away tilts featured the league's third quadruple-bill of the season.

St. Anthony CYO opened the day's schedule by taking Billy's Barber Shop 4-2 behind the brilliant pitching and sticking of Moniz, who limited the opposition to five scattered hits while garnering two himself in three times up. St. Anthony enjoyed a 1-0 lead until the last inning when a three-run splurge proved more than a match for Billy's belated rally. Faustino and Augustine carried the hurling burden for the Barbers and were nicked for seven blows.

Tony Gora swamped Paloma Juniors 16-4 in the second game which was called by Umpire Kawakami in the fifth inning after the victors had walloped three Paloma tossers for nine hits and capitalized heavily on a similar number of errors. Paloma Juniors started the game auspicious ly by scoring three runs in the first inning which was nullified by Tony Gora's ll-run stampede in its half of the same inning. Hitting stars of the Tony Gora victory were Maeda, with a homer and two doubles in four tries, George Miyashiro, with three singles in four trips to the pan, and Sato, with two hits in three attempts.

Acme Beer crushed the Crusaders 20-7 in the third attraction which saw a duplication of the Tony Gora trackfest earlier in the day. Erratic fielding and wildness on the part of Crusader pitchers enabled Acme Beer to pile up the score. Perry cracked out two doubles and Ho a triple and a single for top batting feats.

Young Amateurs closed the day's activities by whipping Shafter Cash & Carry 8-4 for their third victory in as many starts. The Amateurs scored seven runs in the 6th and 7th innings to salt the game away. Hitting honors were shared between Sang, Machado, and Mendonca of Shafter, and Hayashida of Young Amateurs, with two hits each.



Palama Settlement's younger athletes are focusing their guns on a national B.C.A. championship either in Swimming or Indoor Track this year. Training for both competitions will begin early in March under Reed Maxson and Nelson Kawakami, and all eligible Pals are urged to help Palama crash the national-championship column again.

The Pals have not won a national title since 1934, when the age-ruling of 18 years wrecked the great Westside Indoor Track team which also won championships in 1932 and 1933. Palama has never copped a blue ribbon in Swimming, but have finished within the first five on several occasions. Individual champions, however, have been numerous at Palama both in Track and Swimming, and their achievements leave the 1940 team high standards to shoot at.
