RECREATION OFFICE TO MOVE ACROSS HALL

After nearly thirteen years at its present location on the right wing of the Administration building, the Settlement Recreation Office will pull its stakes next week, and move across the hall into the space formerly occupied by the Hawaii Tuberculosis Association, and which more recently served as the site for the Palama Branch Library.

The epoch-making change is necessiteted by the urgent need of the Library for larger quarters to accomodate its growing circulation, which will be fullfilled when the rebuilding of the Boys' Pool and Reading Rooms is completed.

A big feature of the "migration" will be the addition of more shelves in the new Library, giving the Community a wider variety of books to read. Book circulation is expected to hit an alltime high immediately after the Library doors open on July 3rd.

David Kauhane's star-studded Shell Oil outfit crowned themselves Section "C" champions of Palama Settlement's Community Softball League by turning back a scrappy Kaiulani aggregate 5-1 last Sunday morning at Castle Field. The victory came as sweet revenge for a previous 8-2 shell-

Shell Oil drew first blood in the second inning when Harvey scored on Kauhane's high fly into center. The champions rode their one run advantage into the sixth inning behind the brilliant chukking of David Harvey, but two Kaiulani singles in a row tied the count. However, Shell Oil came back in its half of the sixth to tally four big runs on successive hits by Puualoa, Kalau, Chong, and Ikehara There were no further scoring by either team following this splurge.
