ST. ANTHONY CYO WINS PALAMA BASEBALL TITLE

Manager Jack Hewison's St. Anthony CYO ball-tossers won Palama Settlement's 1940 community baseball league title by trouncing Young Amateurs 13-6 Sunday, March 24, at Castle field. The victory gave CYO a perfect record of eight wins for the season and was the Amateurs' first setback in eight starts.

Spectacular and timely stickwork by the St. Anthony outfit proved the deciding factor in the victory. Although out-hit nine to eight, the Catholic Youths crashed out five doubles at opportune moments to demoralize the opposition. Hazelden went the entire route for St. Anthony while Hamada and Horita carried the pitching assignment for Young Amateurs.

St. Anthony scored five runs on five hits in the first inning, one each in the second and third chapters, two in the fourth, one in the fifth, and three more in the seventh frame, while Young Amateurs registered two runs in the first inning, two in the third, and one each in the sixth and ninth innings.

Left-fielder Ohashi of the Young Amateurs copped batting honors of the fray by cracking out three hits in four times up. Hayashida, a team-mate, hit twice in three attempts. Custino and Kaulukukui led the CYO batting parade by connecting for two potent doubles each.

St. Anthony CYO was presented with a beautiful gold trophy symbolic of the championship immediately following the tussle. The titular game was the only tilt played in the scheduled quadruple-bill, the last of the season. The CYO outfit won the 1939 championship under the Frankie's Cab banner.

CHINESE CAGE LEAGUE OPENS SUNDAY IN GYM

With 50,000 fire-crackers tossed into the bargain, sparks are certain to fly when the Chinese Civic Association opens its Novice basketball league with a triple-bill this Sunday, March 31, in the Palama gym. The post-season circuit, open only to Chinese cagers, will bring together Alex Sandwich Shop and Beretania Church in the first game at 1:30 p.m., Chinese "Y" Babes and Narcissus at 2:15, and Market Music and Lotus Beauty Shop in the nightcap at 3:00 o'clock.

Impressive opening ceremonies have been planned by league-director Tommy Wong, whose recent McKinley Associates' circuit was a big success. A top-flight Chinese Band from the Golden Wall Theatre will entertain after the fire-works and speeches. Richard Tongg, prominent local businessman, will fly back from Maui to toss the first ball. Flowers complimenting the Civic Association for their interest in Chinese youth will adorn the lobby of the gym, following which it will be donated to a hospital as messengers of cheer.

The novice cagers will vie for seven beautiful team and individual trophies donated by business firms and men in Honolulu. Triple-attractions will be offered every Sunday afternoon for the next seven weeks.
