PAL SLAM LOOP NEARING END OF 1940 SCHEDULE

Palama Settlement's 1940 community volleyball league will end its schedule with a triple-attraction next Tuesday evening, June 18, in the Westside gym. The tussles were originally scheduled for Tuesday, June 11, but the Kamehameha Day Holiday necessitated the postponement.

Gulick Store continued to occupy the driver's seat in the eight-team circuit after four weeks of action. The Gulicks boast an undefeated record in six starts, and are followed closely by the Fern A. C. outfit with five straight victories. The league championship will be decided when the two teams collide in the second game of a twin-bill Thursday, June 13.

Five forfeits marred a scheduled ninegame attraction on three nights last week due to a mix-up in playing times. However, all tilts played were hard-fought and packed with sizzling action. Makani A. C. downed Palama 15-12, 6-15, and 15-9 in the only game scored Monday, June 3, behind fine slamming by Kauhane, Kealoha, and Opua.

Gulick Store pressed American Sanitary Laundry 15-17, 15-5, and 15-3 in the opening game of a triple-bill Tuesday, June 4. The Laundrymen cracked wide open after winning the first set in brilliant fashion. Keliikoa led the Gulicks to a convincing victory in the final heats. Fern A.C. kept within striking distance of the Gulicks by whipping Palama 15-4, 6-15, and 15-12 in the second game. Swan, Diamond, and Char starred for Fern, while Aiona, Abili, and Kapahua carried the Pal offensive. Just Step Inn took Makani A.C. for a 15-17, 15-4, and 15-8 ride in the final game of the evening.

1940 INTER-CLUB TRACK CHAMPIONS CROWNED

Only one record went by the boards as Japanese Fujiis! Hiromu Kawasaki created a new criterion for the 70-pound High Jump with a 3! $3\frac{1}{2}$ " effort.

PALAMA TENNIS TEAM MAKES FINE SHOWING

The Palama Tennis Club made a fine showing in the Open League which closed its schedule Saturday, June 8, on city and rural courts. Palama hung up a record of 15 victories against 25 losses for a .308 percentage in its first year of big-time competition.
