THREE TEAMS UNDEFEATED IN BAREFOOT LEAGUE

Only three aggregations sported undefeated records following completion of the third week of play in the Citywide-Palama 130# barefoot football league Sunday, September 24, on city and rural grid-irons.

Loo's Place and Two-Step Inn, East and West Section favorites respectively, came through with their third consecutive victories, while the idle Ewa outfit remained on top to form the select triumvirate.

Masuto Fujii's hard-hitting Two-Step Inn barefooters crushed Barbecue Inn 26-0 behind a brilliant assortment of power plays to assume the top position in West Section standings. The Two-Steppers have not been scored upon in three games.

Waipahu, sparked by Takemi Arakawa, upset Charlie Chan 12-7 for its first win of the season. A blocked punt in the first quarter paved the way for Waipahu's first score. Charlie Chan tallied in the second period and converted to forge into the van, but Arakawa circled end for 40 yards and a touchdown in the final quarter to sew up the game.

Alfred Espinda's defending-champion Aiea Rams flashed old-time form to whip the Pal Babes 25-0 at Aiea. Battled to a standstill from scrimmage, Aiea uncorked a versatile aerial attack, with Nadai on the pitching end, to swamp the Pals.

Loo's Place chalked up its second one-point victory in a row by nipping Hinode Kai 7-6 at Cartwright field. A pass, Yap to Freitas, for 40 yards and a score in the second quarter gave Loo's Place six points. Freitas plowed his way over the goal-line for what proved to be the winning margin. Hinode Kai tallied in the third quarter on a line buck from the two-yard stripe after Matoi had returned Freitas' punt 90 yards through a broken field.

Waialae YMA trampled Hui Makai 20-0, and Smile Cafe walloped Lido Cafe 18-6 in the remaining East Section tussles.

PALAMA BOXERS ASKED TO MEET THIS SUNDAY

All members of Palama Settlement's boxing team are requested to meet at the Settlement gym at 9:00 p.m. this Sunday, October 1, to begin training for the 1939-40 Dual-Meet and Championship season.

Tommy Wong's Pirates "B" cage stars assumed the leadership of Palama Settlement's 110# basketball league by turning back Raymond Choo's Hui Aliis 14-12 in an overtime tussle Thursday evening, September 21, in the Westside gym. The victory was the Pirates' third in a row, stamping them top contenders for the title held by B. K. Yamamoto. Thomas Young scored the winning basket in the extra period and was also high-scorer for the Buccaneers. Charley Raymond sparkled for Hui Alii by registering six points.
