
"What does Palama mean to you?"

Palama Press would indeed introduce the staff of the Music Department, the instructors are both new comers and those who've been working here for the past two years or more.



NEW SODA MACHINES


Two new (can soda) vending machine were installed during this pass week. The machine would be in full operateion by Tuesday.
