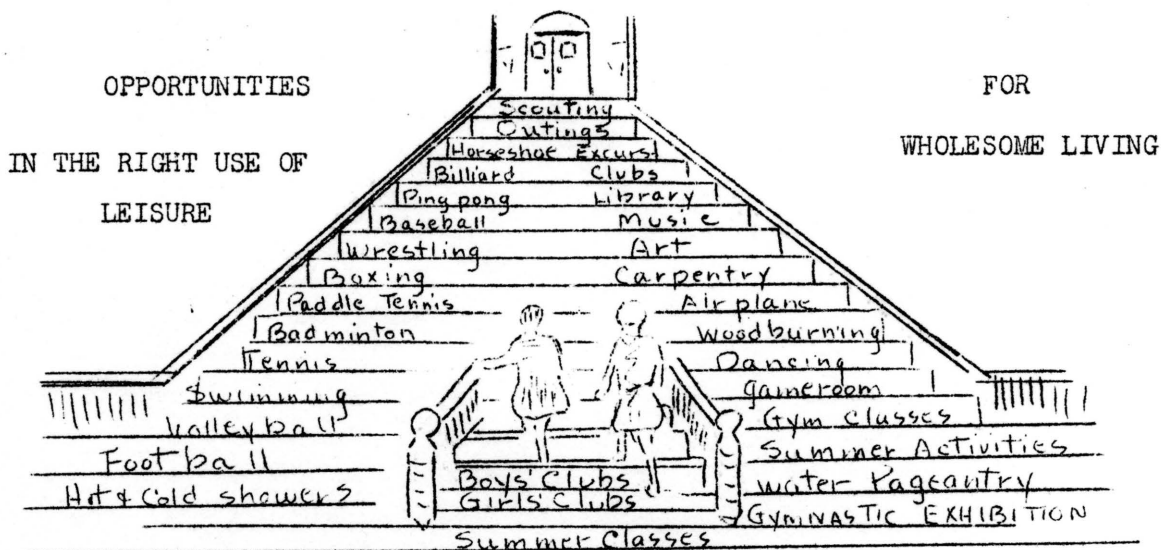

BAREFOOT FOOTBALL TO START SOON

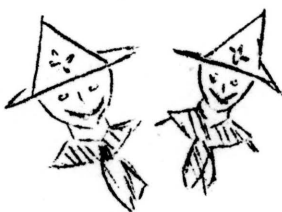
Because of the "later than usual" pineapple season this year officials of the City-wide Palama Barefoot Football Leagues have decided to defer the opening of the season one week later than usual. The curtain for the skirmish will be formally lifted on the third Sunday, September 19th.

Limited number of the Settlement's 125 and 140 pound candidates are already holding light workouts to "get the jump" on the intensive training season only a few weeks ahead.

It is too early at present to predict the number of clubs that will enter the competition or to prophesy any rating of the possible outcome of the season as a whole. Nearly all the 1936 clubs are expected to re-enter the 1937 trophy chase. Hinode Kai and McImerny in the city division and Waipahu in the rural district will again be powerful contenders for the cup.

In the 140 pound division the Pawaa and Pel Junior aggregations are already aiming daggers at each other's camp. The fans are looking forward to witness a real combat when these two powerful teams clash.
